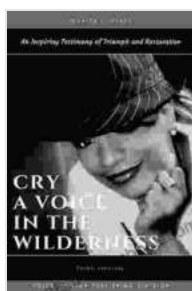

commitment to follow Christ. His message of repentance and forgiveness is as relevant today as it was in his own time.

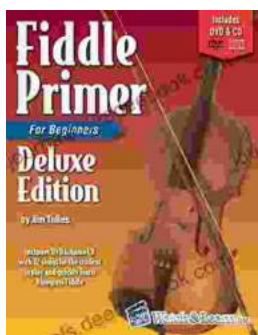
