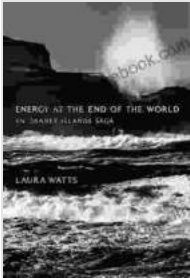

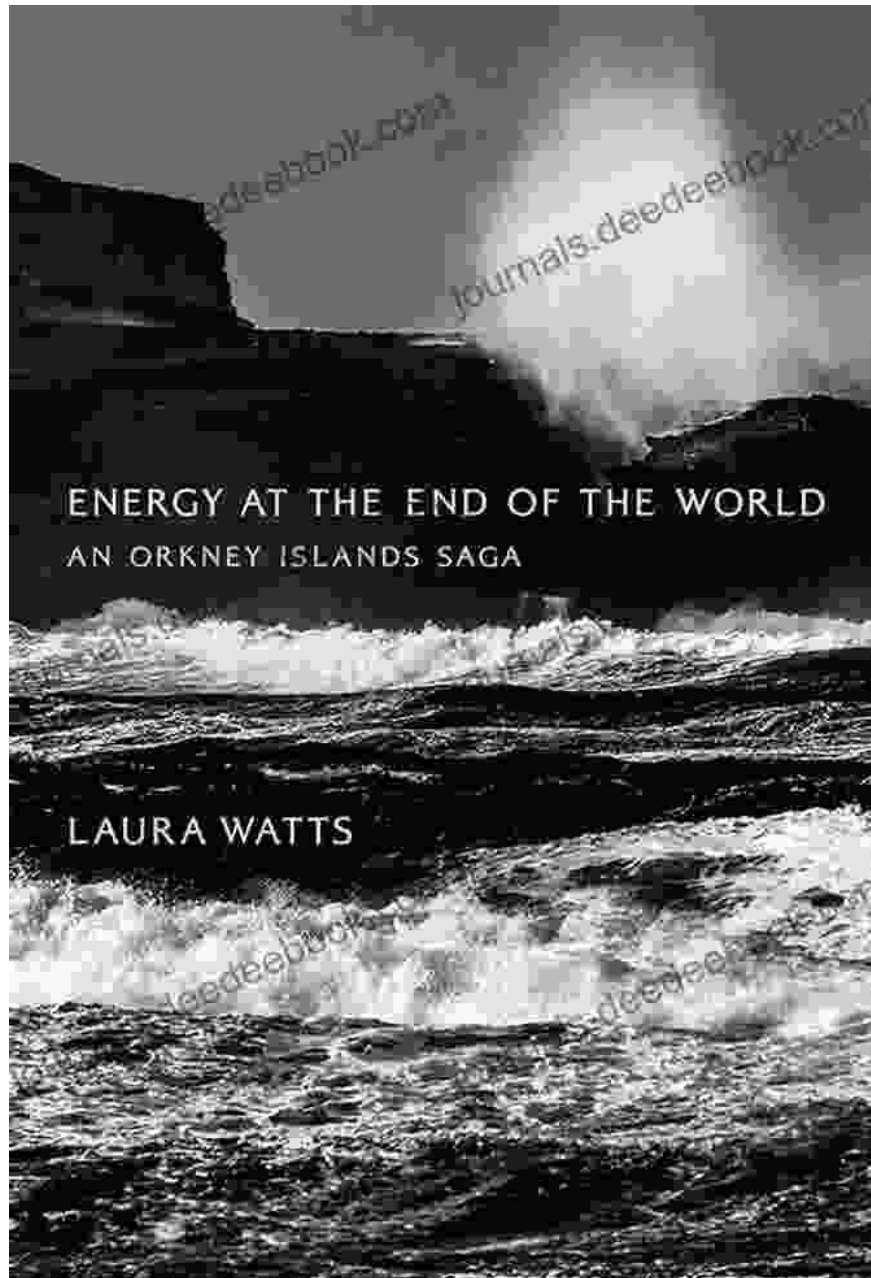

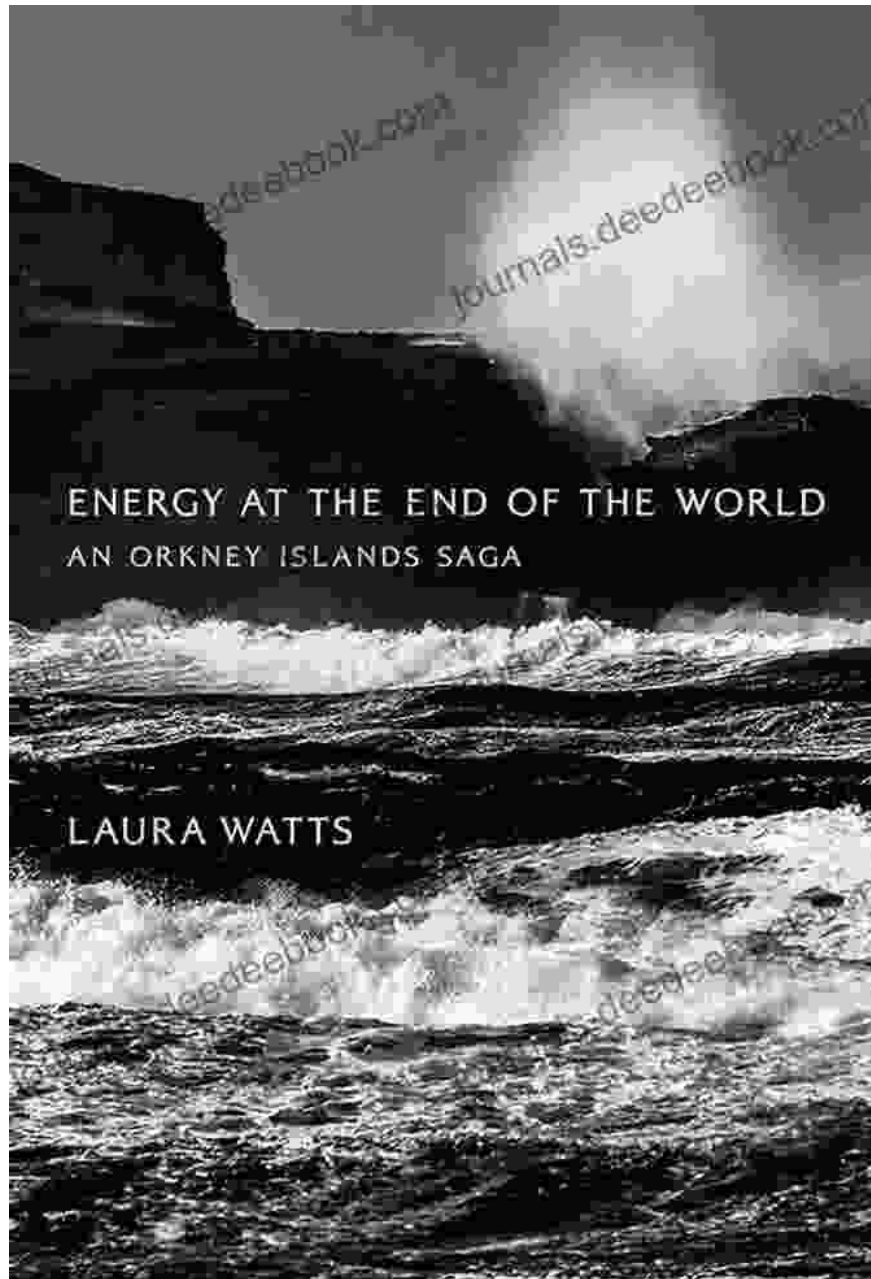


Kirkwall Airport, providing vital air connectivity to the Orkney Islands.

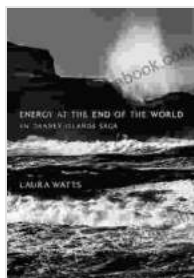

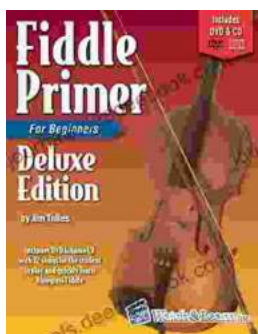

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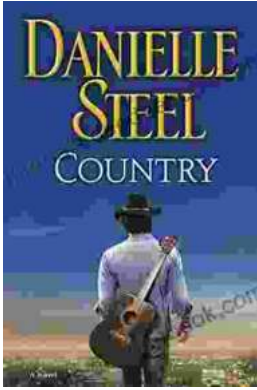
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
